

The owners of this home, a young couple, wanted a practical and stylish update to their modest kitchen that would last them for years to come. AFTER

Although the remodel was dogged by problems typical of many current projects - appliance back-orders, items damaged upon delivery, etc. - Leverett's team rolled with the punches in $order\ to\ ultimately\ produce\ a\ classic,\ chic\ space$ with greatly improved functionality. Per the homeowners' preference for natural materials, the island bar top features a striking reclaimed piece of zebra wood with a book-matched waterfall end, offset by white cabinetry and a contrasting black range hood and backsplash.
